In a time of deep division and vitriolic rhetoric around issues of race, ethnicity, gender, and sexuality, and where the dignity of people living with disabilities or mental health issues are often ignored, demonized, or turned into a joke, we promise to:

Welcome all people of every age, gender, race, national origin, faith expression, marital status & family structure, sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression, physical ability, mental or emotional condition, economic and social status, and educational background to share in the life, leadership, ministry, fellowship, worship, sacraments, responsibilities, blessings, and joys of our church family.

The Rainbow Flag: We proudly display a rainbow flag at the front of our sanctuary as a visual declaration of God's extravagant and inclusive love, as well as of our own "promise of welcome" to all people. Our prayer is that all can be their truest selves here. This flag serves as a particular signal that our church is a safe and affirming space for LGBTQ persons to be, to belong, to lead, to question, and to grow in faith.

We practice an "open table," which means everyone is welcome to partake. There is no creed you must first confess or dogma you must first believe. God meets us where we are—amidst our questions and doubts, our fears and failures—and offers us bread and cup: nourishment and a blessing amidst life's journey.

Invitation & Words of Institution Prayer of Thanksgiving

Sharing Bread & Cup "All Belong Here" refrain (p. 6)

Please come forward by forming one line in the center aisle. As you come forward, join in our sung response. After receiving communion, we invite you to continue moving around the sanctuary for the prayer stations.

Responding to God's Invitation: Prayer Stations

Lent is an invitation to journey through our questions and doubts, fears and longings, griefs and wounds—to journey through the wildernesses of life instead of trying to avoid them. This year, we're imagining the wilderness as "The Land of the Seeking." This is a time for connecting with what it is that you are seeking as you journey through the wilderness.

During this time (~5-7min), as the music plays, we invite you to freely visit different prayer stations. <u>Take your time</u>. This works best if you don't try to visit all the prayer stations each week; linger where your heart feels called and receive what you need as you journey toward new life. (see next page for stations)

Waiting in the Wilderness: The wilderness can be a season of silence; of waiting; a time when our most pressing questions have no simple or straightforward answers. Allow yourself to remain in your pew and sit in silence as you wait on God.

Wall of the Seeking: What is it your heart seeks? What questions do you carry? Write them down on our Wall of the Seeking. Pause to notice what others are seeking; offer a prayer for your fellow sojourners and receive theirs for you.

Water of Release: What is weighing you down? What do you need to release in order to journey toward new life? Take a slow, deep breath as you drop a stone—or stones—into the bowl of water as you release this burden.

Table of Offering: What is it you have to offer for the healing of the world God so loves? Place your donation to the church, Raise the Roof fund, or Love Offering supporting a community partner in the basket. Sign up on a clipboard. Or, email Pastor Eric or our Moderator, Sharon McKee (mccubs@gmail.com), with a new idea!

Baptismal Blessing: Dip your fingers in the baptismal font and mark your forehead in the sign of the cross or circle as a reminder of God's infinite and irrevocable love for you as you are, and your desire for this love to heal and keep making you new.

Prayer Candles: Light a candle and offer a prayer for a loved one or for a place / people around the world who are suffering.

Wonder Wall: Each card has a different question; take one (or a few). Real connection begins with wonder. In the week ahead, plan a time over coffee, at dinner, or at bedtime with a family member or friend to wonder together on this question, and see what happens in your relationship.

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

Raise the Roof Campaign—*** UPDATE ***

After years of patchwork, a couple years ago we had to replace two major sections of our flat roof—the first time since the roof's construction when the church was built in the 1960s. The time has come for us to finish this work and complete the third and final section. The cost of this final phase is just under \$100,000. But, we still have \$67,000 left over from fundraising during the first two phases! This means that all we have left to raise is \$30,000.

Our goal is to raise this \$30,000 by May 1.

A fund-raising challenge has been made! An anonymous donor has agreed to provide HALF of the remaining balance on our roof repairs if the congregation can raise the other half -- \$15,000 -- by our May 1 deadline. Please prayerfully consider whether you might be able to help; any amount will get us closer to the goal. By working together, we can soon gather, minister, and worship under a soundly-repaired roof.

As stewards entrusted with this gift that was handed down to us by our faithful forebears, please consider what you can offer to help us keep a roof over our heads, and so that we too can bless another generation.

Donations can be mailed in (612 W. State St.) or placed in the basket on the "Table of Offering" during Lent. For checks, please specify "Roof Fund" on the memo. We hope to have an online giving option available on our website soon!

OUR FEDERATED VALUES

We believe in God

At the center of our faith is the surprising, unsettling, and deeply personal God found in the Bible, most profoundly revealed in the life, teachings, death, and resurrection of Jesus. At Federated, our primary interest is not merely talking *about* God, but in *encountering* the Mysterious Force at the heart of the universe. This is a God who comforts us where we need to be comforted and challenges us where we've become complacent. This is a God who will not be confined to dogmatic teachings, nor even to the Bible. We believe that we are invited to encounter this God everywhere: in nature, science, one another, and in other religious traditions as well.

Each person is on a unique spiritual journey

We value faith as a journey rather than a destination. We recognize that each person is at a different place on their journey, so we focus on "testimonies" of faith rather than "tests" of faith; stories of how we are being transformed, rather than dogmas we must affirm. Here, you are welcome to belong, question, explore, and lead whether you grew up in church and loved it, or you've had a painful relationship with Christianity; you are welcome whether you feel your faith is unshakeable or you're not sure if you believe in God at all. You are welcome to join a community of people "on the way": encouraging and caring for one another, learning and growing together, and serving alongside each other as we build, in some small way, the world we believe God dreams of.

Building authentic community across our differences

We are an "Open and Affirming" congregation, which is our way of saying that we value diversity. In a time of deep division, we believe it is paramount to gather people from a variety of backgrounds, experiences, and identities in order to build authentic relationships and community. We believe that the simple but courageous work of showing up and being together in this way is one necessary element in healing our nation and world's deep divisions.

We believe in peace through justice

In this congregation, conversations regarding racism, sexism, poverty, war, immigration, homophobia, hunger, abuse, and a host of other issues are commonplace, both from the pulpit and around the table. We know that the Realm of God is not being experienced on earth so long as people are being hurt. With Martin Luther King Jr., we believe that we are all "caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny," and that "none of us can be free until all are free." Which means that, as a community, we have a God-given responsibility and mission to work for justice and healing in our neighborhood and beyond. Jesus says: "I have come that they may have life and have it abundantly" (John 10:10). This work is defined not merely by what we are against, but the vision we are for—flourishing for all!
