# Responding to God's Invitation: Prayer Stations

Advent is an invitation to journey into our deepest longings; to move toward those places in our world and within ourselves shrouded in darkness. Here, we hear the whispers of angels delivering a surprising message: "do not fear." Rather than denying our fears, these prayer stations invite you to hear this as an invitation to move through—and thus beyond—them; this is what it looks like to insist on hope.

During this time (~10 min), we invite you to freely visit these virtual prayer stations. <u>Take your time</u>. This is a "pilgrimage of the soul." Rather than trying to visit every station, linger where your heart feels called.

Virtual prayer stations indicated in **blue** can be found at <u>this link</u> or at the end or the bulletin. Join us in worship to experience the additional prayer stations.

**Dwelling in the Darkness:** Advent is a time of watchful waiting. Such seasons can be agonizing. Yet even in this darkness, God is present. *In your pew, meditate on the poem and prompt inserted in the bulletin (p.6-7).* 

**Divine Seeing:** Pause to look more deeply at the artwork (p.8-9) inspired by today's scripture. Consider the artist's statement as you look at the art.

**Prayer Candles:** Light a candle and offer a prayer for a loved one or a people / place around the world who are weary, afraid, grieving, or suffering.

Naming our Fears: Write a word or phrase of something you fear.

**Welcoming Angels:** On the angel, write a response to the prompt, which will change with each week. (p.10)

**Alternative Nativity:** Because we've heard the Christmas story so many times, it can lose its power. *Encounter the story anew as it is juxtaposed with contemporary images.* 

Table of Offering: Place your donation to support our ministries or Mission Offering.

**Guiding Stones:** Pick a black stone. Use an acrylic marker to write a word or short phrase that helps guide you out of fear. Leave it for the season as a guide for others.

**Practices for Moving through Fear:** Use these resources to help you move through fear this season. Some are more personal and intimate; others are opportunities to dispel fear by acting in faith, hope, and love with/for others. Specific resources will change throughout the season.



# "God in the Kitchen"

I called home my first semester of college. I told my mom I was fine, but I was homesick.

She must have heard the truth in my voice.

The ache ate at me. It was a long, slow song, a million tiny ants slurping the juice from a peach.

I was tender and bruised, in the doldrums of it all.

But she could hear all of that. So three states away,

she preheated the oven. Three states away,

she tossed blueberries in a thin layer of flour. Three states away,

she dusted a layer of streusel over the soft peaks

of a dozen warm muffins. And three days later,

I unboxed a package from home—

a dozen blueberry muffins, a love letter with my name on it, a reminder that I was not alone.

If you're running out of hope, count to three.

God is in the kitchen. She's just waiting for yeast to rise.



# WHEN WE'RE RUNNING OUT OF HOPE, GOD IS AT WORK

# "Hope Like A Dancer"



John the Baptist was thrown in prison after publicly questioning the legality of Herod's marriage (Mt 14). He was not afraid to go toe-to-toe with the powerful, and perhaps he expected Jesus' ministry to look more confrontational and politically strategic. In questioning Jesus, I wonder if John sought a particular answer to hang his hope on, that maybe the Messiah would be how he'd imagined him. Maybe Jesus would bust him out of jail and take things straight to Herod, but Jesus

offers something else.

In this image, John sits in prison, letting the disciples' testimony settle in. People with hearing, visual, and physical impairments experience new senses and mobility. Those with skin diseases are cleansed. Those with little material comfort are offered irrepressible hope, and the lungs of the dead are filled with the breath of life.

I imaged this good news through the dancing light of a lantern in John's prison cell. I chose dancing figures because dancing feels like a primal response to the radical healing taking place outside the prison walls. As these six dancers illuminate the cell, I imagine John, even if for a moment, breaking into laughter at the magnitude of Jesus' ministry. Jesus was quite literally doing the unimaginable. He was removing barriers so that the marginalized were no longer reduced to begging and sitting on mats, shoved to the edges of society. He was not only healing physical ailments; perhaps more importantly, he was restoring people to community.

Out of all the miraculous actions mentioned, the news did not include "release of the captives" (Luke 4). With this message, John would know he was not going to be freed, and so, the number of dancers would remain one short of seven. As we know all too well, God's work isn't completed in Jesus' time. We are still woefully short of realizing the fullness of God's desire for all of creation, and the work is ours to see through. Until then, let us keep our eyes peeled for the glimmers of hope dancing all around us and work toward a day when all can join in that dance of wholeness.

In the Bible, "angels" are messengers from God inviting us to move toward something necessary—but also scary—which is why they always say, "do not be afraid." In fact, "do not be afraid" may be *the* message they bring.

How will we spend these days of waiting for God's Love to be born? If we answer the angels' call, we'll spend it acting on hope, not fear. We'll proclaim peace when others exploit our anxieties. We'll cultivate courage and joy, undeterred by the powers of evil.

#### Advent II:

When John is running out of hope, Jesus points him to signs that God is still at work. When you are running out of hope, what "signs" remind you that God is still at work?



# **OUR FEDERATED VALUES**

#### We believe in God

At the center of our faith is the surprising, unsettling, and deeply personal God found in the Bible, most profoundly revealed in the life, teachings, death, and resurrection of Jesus. At Federated, our primary interest is not merely talking *about* God but *encountering* the Mysterious Force at the heart of the universe. This is a God who who comforts us where we need to be comforted and challenges us where we've become complacent. This is a God who will not be confined to dogmatic teachings, nor even to the Bible. We believe that we are invited to encounter this God everywhere: in nature, science, one another, and in other religious traditions as well.

## We believe each person is on a unique spiritual journey

We value faith as a journey rather than a destination. We recognize that each person is at a different place on their journey, so we focus on "testimonies" of faith rather than "tests" of faith; stories of how we are being transformed, rather than dogmas we must affirm. Here, you are welcome to belong, question, explore, and lead whether you grew up in church and loved it, or you've had a painful relationship with Christianity; you are welcome whether you feel your faith is unshakeable or you're not sure if you believe in God at all. You are welcome to join a community of people "on the way": encouraging and caring for one another, learning and growing together, and serving alongside each other as we build, in some small way, the world we believe God dreams of.

# We believe in building authentic community across our differences

We are an "Open and Affirming" congregation, which is our way of saying that we value diversity. In a time of deep division, we believe it is paramount to gather people across lines of difference—race, class, culture, citizenship status, gender, sexuality, age, and ability—not merely to tolerate each other, but to build authentic relationships and true belonging. We believe the simple but courageous work of showing up in this way is one necessary element in healing our nation and world's deep divisions.

## We believe in working for peace through solidarity & justice

At Federated, conversations about racism, sexism, transphobia, poverty, immigration, hunger, and a host of other issues are commonplace—from the pulpit and around the table. With Dr. King, we believe we are all "caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny," and that "none of us can be free until all are free." In this spirit, in 2025 our Leadership Board initiated a series of conversations with the congregation, and together we discerned a mission priority for the church to act for "immigrant justice," adopting this covenant to guide us: "As a community of faith, we commit to protecting our migrant neighbors through acts of sanctuary, solidarity, and justice. We will not stand by in the face of unjust enforcement. We will act, love, and speak as our faith commands—with courage and compassion."
